2018 A Year In Review

Lakes & Prairies Community Action Partnership (CAPLP) is proud to be part of the nationwide anti-poverty network that has been working to eliminate poverty in our community since 1964. Our vision is to be a strong, responsive organization that provides hope and life changing opportunities for people to help themselves and each other. We work toward this vision through our three main divisions, Head Start, Housing and Economic Empowerment. These divisions provide over 30 programs and services that work to help people change their lives every day. Our mission is to "Eliminate poverty by empowering families and engaging communities."

CAPLP continues to grow our programs in response to the needs that we have identified in the communities we serve, including strengthening our workforce development programming, expanding services to senior citizens, increasing access to high-quality affordable childcare options, and supporting affordable housing. While our primary service area is in Clay and Wilkin counties in West Central Minnesota, many of our programs and services reach beyond the borders of these two counties, including Child Care Aware, Rainbow Bridge, and Workforce Development.

In addition to our ongoing work within each division, over the past year CAPLP has fully embraced the concept of "Multi-Generational" or "2 Gen" services across our organization. While we have secured some additional funding to support this effort, the majority of our work has been about aligning our services. It is truly a philosophy of service, not a special program. We have incorporated "Shared Case Management" processes where our division staff that provide case management services meet regularly to jointly case manage and share critical information about how we can best support families to succeed. We have also hired a Resource Navigator that will provide comprehensive intake and referral services for all agency programs.

Over the past year, our organization has been working on increasing awareness of our programs and services in the community. Part of that branding included a new nickname CAPLP accompanied by a new website www.caplp.org and new email addresses. We are delighted to move forward in our work with this updated logo and nickname as our brand.

We continue our work on our 5-year strategic plan, including:

Goal 1: Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.

- Strategy 1: Implement a coordinated, multi-generational service model across the agency.
- Strategy 2: Grow agency resources to address identified needs.

Goal 2: Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer opportunity.


- Strategy 1: Provide leadership to partners to identify and develop solutions that improve the entire community.
- Strategy 2: Be the voice for the people we serve.

Goal 3: People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities.

- Strategy 1: Empower people to advocate for the needs of low income people.
- Strategy 2: Develop opportunities for low income people to give back to their community. Goal 4: Increase agency capacity to achieve results.
- Strategy 1: Improve administrative capacity to support program operations.
- Strategy 2: Incorporate all Pathways to Excellence standards agency-wide.





Program Highlight: Group Workcamp




2018 brought another great Group Workcamp project in collaboration with Group Cares Foundation and West Central MN Communities Action! We had over 271 volunteers stay at the Breckenridge school and provide home repairs to 26 residents of Wilkin County. During their week here, they completed 30 exterior painting projects, 7 interior painting projects, 17 porches, 5 wheel chair ramps, and 9 weatherization projects.

Program Highlight: Somali Child Care



Child Care continues to be one of top barriers families identify that prevents them from working, and finding child care is especially difficult when parents are in need of culturally specific care. CAPLP is partnering with West Central Initiative, the Blue Cross Blue Shield Foundation, the Afro American Development Association, and over 20 other community partners and stakeholders to implement the Somali Child Care Project. The goals of this project are:

- 1. To provide a safe and healthy child care environment for Somali children.
- 2. To support Somali women in understanding and navigating the child care system.
- 3. To support Somali women in becoming legally non-licensed or licensed child care providers.


To date this project has assisted 5 Somalian individuals in becoming legally non-licensed providers, and we continue to work with other interested individuals to become providers. This program is accomplished by providing the following activities:

- Create a functional model of supporting Somali speaking women through the process
- Contract with multi-lingual individuals with health & safety and child care knowledge to support the process
- Continue relationship/trust building within the Somali community, especially through ongoing participation teaching English Language classes at the Afro American Development Association
- Consult with Somali individuals and connect them with resources to explore feasibility of starting a child care business
- Support Somali individuals in the application process and the business planning process



Program Highlight: Homeless Outreach

CAPLP recently began providing Homeless
Outreach services through a partnership with the
Clay County HRA. This program provides street
outreach and supportive services for people
experiencing homelessness to help them navigate
the homeless response system. The story below
illustrates the work that we do everyday in this
program.





"As an outreach worker I try to meet the clients where they are literally, mentally, physically, and emotionally. Shortly after I started this position, I met a gentleman named James who was released from Clay County Jail 2 hours before stepping into my office. When I met him his sobriety was inconsistent, he did not have custody of his daughter, had no job, and was sleeping on a couch at one of the local shelters. James had no reason to trust me but over time we were able to establish a great working relationship. When we first met, he was hesitant to open up about some of the hardships he has faced, but with consistency and a listening ear he was able to be vulnerable and fully communicate what exactly he needs. Since then, James has been able to gain full time employment, he has received a car from Fix It Forward Ministry, he was approved for a Housing Support program where he receives monthly rental assistance, utility assistance, and case management, and he has graduated from outpatient treatment. James has been successfully housed now since November of 2018. He has even gotten to spend more time with his daughter now that he has a spare bedroom for her to stay in. James still keeps in touch with me to let me know how things are going, he has even referred a friend for assistance!" -Alexa, Homeless Outreach Worker


CAPLP Affordable Housing Programs help people who are experiencing homelessness or are precariously housed to obtain and maintain safe, affordable housing.





Program Highlight: Head Start

In the fall of 2018 CAPLP received \$328,598 to expand Early Head Start home visiting to an additional 24 children and their families. This is a new grant to CAPLP funded by the Minnesota Department of Health. In addition to doing the Early Head Start model we also report on various Health and Safety best practices including Intimate Partner Violence, Safe Sleep, Maternal Mental Health and other health initiatives.

Average Monthly Attendance for this grant is 96%! Parents are coached with the "Parents as Teachers" curriculum. Families are setting both child and family goals and we are seeing strong outcomes and engagement. Our Head Start families are the experts at explaining the benefits of the program:

"I chose Head Start because I know they will be there for my family. My child has already learned so much in Head Start when his home visitor comes to our apartment. He loves when she comes over. She is always asking me how I am and making sure we have everything we need."



"Head Start is a great program and I am so happy our family found it. I enjoy having the home visitor come over every week and I know my daughter does too. We are both learning a lot. They have helped our family a lot so far this year."


