2019 A Year in Review

We are proud of the amazing work that our entire team at CAPLP accomplishes every day to ensure that we achieve our mission to: "Eliminate poverty by empowering families and engaging communities." Our organization provides services through three main divisions: Head Start, Housing, and Economic Empowerment. Within these divisions our team provides over 30 programs and services that work together toward our mission. While CAPLP has been doing this work since the War on Poverty began over 55 years ago, we continue to adapt and respond to the changing needs in the communities we serve.

Over the past year, CAPLP takes pride in persistently being an essential community partner in providing services to low-income families across Clay and Wilkin Counties in Minnesota. While we continue to provide essential community services such as Head Start, Child Care Aware, Affordable Housing, and VITA Tax Site, we have also expanded to provide several new services. CAPLP recently launched several new programs: Refugee Resettlement services to assist refugees in successfully navigating our complex systems and Rural Routes senior transportation services to connect seniors that reside in rural Clay County to door-to-door transportation. We have also expanded our senior services to provide support to keep seniors living independently as long as possible. Lastly, we now provide expanded Workforce Development programming to assist households in securing living wage employment.

In addition to the new programming that has been implemented, CAPLP has fully embraced the Whole Family Approach to providing services to families in need in our community. This approach focuses on meeting the needs and overcoming the obstacles of each member of a family. We have recently added a Whole Family Coordinator to synchronize the agencywide implementation of this approach, as well as a Whole Family Resource Navigator who serves as a first point of contact for our community members in need. We have begun piloting a "No Wrong Door" Assessment Tool and plan to implement this tool agency wide. This approach ensures we are providing bundled services to households which has been proven to be most effective at lifting families out of poverty.


CAPLP continues to work toward our broad agency-wide goals that are outlined in our five-year Strategic Plan:







Jamie's Story - CAPLP's Whole Family Approach

At CAPLP we believe we are better together because we coordinate services and collaborate across programs to better serve our community. Our Whole Family Approach focuses on the barriers each family member faces to help them move from barely surviving to fully thriving. Jamie found CAPLP by enrolling her youngest daughter in Head Start. While getting


to know the family, the Head Start Teacher recognized Jamie's need for skill training and employment, so she referred her to our Workforce Development Program.

My name is Jamie and I am a 33-year-old Native American mother of 4 children. I would do anything to ensure my children have better childhoods than what I experienced. Drugs, alcohol, & abuse were all I knew growing up. I knew I would have to fight for my children to have a better life, but I didn't know where to start.

I was working in fast food & unable to pay my bills. I've tried many jobs over the years. I was a file clerk, bartender, & server. I have always had an interest in the medical field & knew I Laila, Jamie's youngest child loved helping people. My interest started

when I was just a little girl. I was in a bad car accident with my parents. I remember how the nurses & doctors were so compassionate & wanted to help. I am a caregiver; it comes naturally, & I hoped I could someday act on my passion.

CAPLP's Workforce Development Case Manager. I enrolled in the Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) Program, making my childhood dream a reality. I attended class at 8 a.m. each morning often after working a shift until 2 or 3 a.m. It was difficult to maintain my job & family while training for my CNA, but CAPLP walked with me every step of the way. I received support & encouragement that I've never felt before in my life. CAPLP's Housing Program helped get my family into an apartment & they even helped get beds for my kids to sleep in. My kids were so excited to have their own beds! The support of CAPLP didn't stop after the CNA class ended. I was encouraged to apply for jobs & I was hired full-time as a CNA at a local nursing home. I have worked very hard to be where I

am today & I'm proud of how far I've come.



Program Highlight: Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)




- Our VITA site is dependent on volunteers to help low-income families complete their taxes free of charge
- VITA sites are located in Moorhead, Barnesville, Breckenridge & Hawley, Minnesota
- Many families utilizing VITA also utilize programs such as Head Start, Housing, Workforce Development, & Senior Services
- CAPLP's VITA site saves families an average of \$300 on tax preparation fees

A young, single mother with three children came into CAPLP for help preparing her taxes. She didn't file the year before, so the VITA volunteer helped her prepare both years of taxes for her and her family. As her taxes were prepared, this mom excitedly talked about her new, higher paying job that she had worked toward for three years! She was finally able to move her family out of a very small apartment and into a townhome with more space. This hardworking mom went on to mention that she hoped to get a decent return so she could pay off some bills. She also needed to repair her car but said that would have to wait as she couldn't afford to fix it right now.

After working so hard to make life better for her kids, this mom was finally rewarded. She received over \$13,000 in tax returns! She was in shock at how much she was getting back. This amount would help her catch up on all her bills and her family's financial needs would be met. She could even afford to fix her car! Her kids had been asking about going on a vacation for a long time, and she finally might be able to make their dream a reality!

Program Highlight: Housing



Jocelyn lost everything when a devastating fire destroyed her home. She was forced to take her two children and stay with family. Her father was arrested, and she was no longer able to stay at his house. Desperate, she tried to get emergency shelter for her two children but was unsuccessful. She was forced to sleep in her car with her children.

After the second night in the car, Jocelyn walked into CAPLP's office. Our Housing team was able to get her enrolled in our Family Homeless Prevention & Assistance Program. They worked with a landlord and the family was able to move into housing that day! Jocelyn didn't stop with housing. She also enrolled in our Workforce Development Program and earned her CNA Certification. Life for her family is stabilizing and she was offered a full-time position working in a nursing home!

"Since CAPLP has been in my life, I've gotten my CNA license, learned how to be financially stable, and found a job to help me advance my nursing career. CAPLP acted as my extended family when I felt the most alone. My family is forever grateful, and I can't thank CAPLP enough."






Program Highlight: Head Start Hero

Tyrese is a Head Start Hero! He has been honored by the MN Head Start Association with the Head Start Heroe Award for a currently enrolled Head Start child who has made tremendous developmental progress while enrolled in a Head Start program.

Tyrese came into Head Start with a lot of trauma and a chip on his shoulder. He verbally and physically lashed out at teachers and other students. Tyrese was unable to trust or comply, making sitting for lessons or learning to play with other children a seemingly unreachable goal. Underneath his trauma and behaviors, however, we could see the smart, loyal, and social child wanting to come out.

The progress Tyrese has made in our Head Start Program

is remarkable. While he once communicated through hitting, cursing, and yelling, he now uses incredibly insightful and polite words. While he was once filled with uncontrollable emotion, Tyrese can now recognize his emotions and handle them before his feelings escalate. This allows teachers and his peers to see his profound kindness, steadfast loyalty, quick wit, and problem solving. We are most proud of his developmental gains, especially Tyrese's play with his peers. His peers have gone from being afraid of Tyrese and his anger

to loudly proclaiming to their parents, "Tyrese is my friend!" He has encouraging words for friends who are

struggling. Tyrese has turned into a friend who is excellent at sharing everything from toys to the stickers that he gets as a reward for his behavior. Hands that were once used for hitting now give hugs and high fives.

Tyrese's incredible improvement makes all of us excited to see what is next. Tyrese is growing so fast and really overcoming the odds. Our next challenge will be keeping up with his newfound skills. Tyrese is a Head Start Hero on track for success in kindergarten!

Head Start & Early Head Start provide quality educational experiences at no cost to income eligible families. Services are provided to pregnant moms and children up to age five. Family support, health, and nutrition are incorporated into the program.







Program Highlight: Senior Services

Throughout the year, Janice worked with our Senior Navigator in Rural Clay County to help her remain in her home, so she could maintain her independence. After assessing for in-home supports, we realized the home needed extensive repairs with a leaky roof and damaged back door due to someone trying to break in. Janice's Senior Navigator talked with Rebuilding Together Fargo-Moorhead Area to see if they could help. They were able to fix Janice's house so she could remain in her home!




